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Topic: Crime and Punishment- ICT/Research Group Task

- In your answer/s you will be assessed on how well you:
- Explain all key features related to the history of punishment, including groups and individuals.
 - Evaluate the success and failure of prisons and other forms of punishment
 - Gather, organise and communicate information using the designated technology skills.
 - Appropriately communicate information effectively in verbal, written, visual and digital form.

Task Information:
You will need to research then create a historical documentary using iMovie, Movie maker Animoto or any other presentation software to respond to the following:

Explain and evaluate the changing nature of prisons AND punishment from ancient to modern times.

- You must include:
- An explanation of the key features relating to each punishment and how it has changed over time. You will need to discuss the following key features:
 1. General information relating to punishments: How did the need for prisons arise? How did society change over time? How did the use of different forms of punishment change over time?
 2. Prisons: history, purpose, how prisons changed over time, conditions, who, where,
 3. Capital Punishment: What is it? What methods were used?
 4. Penal Transportation: What is it? Why was it used? Where were they sent?
 5. Whipping: What is it and why was it used?
 6. Pillory: What is it and why was it used?
 7. Fines: What could a person be fined for? How was it used?
 - You must include:
 - an evaluation of the successes and failures of these punishment methods
 - A variety of images and/or written sources to support your answer. These may be in the form of documents, pictures, diagrams and/or charts etc.
 - A bibliography of at least five websites and/or books which you have used to gather your information from. Copy and paste the direct web address and/or title and author of the book you have used in your research.

ICT and Presentation Guidelines:

- You will be assessed on your overall presentation. Consider colour, visual appeal, the ability to hear, see, read and understand your information.
- Divide your information in the documentary into clearly defined sections
- All pictures, diagrams or charts must be labelled and explained.
- During the documentary, you must include:
 - music or sounds
 - A voice recording of information (at least 3 minutes of speaking per group member)
 - Text with the key points
 - images
 - Optional: video recordings or downloaded youtube clips (no more than 2 minutes long per clip)

Other information and submission requirements:

- You will be taught the basics of how to use Animoto and iMovie.
- You will be given at least one lesson per cycle to research and create your documentary during class, so additional work must be completed at home
- You may choose to complete this task individually or in small groups of 2:
 - If working on this task in a small group, you must ensure that all members have equal input into the creation of the task and each student makes at least a 3 minute voice recording relating to the task content to receive the marks.
 - If you complete this task individually, you only need to complete 1-3 key features. You must include at least a 3 minute voice recording
- You must refer to the marking criteria to ensure you meet the content (research) and ICT (technology) requirements of the task.
- This task is to be handed in on a USB or on Google Classroom during class on the due date. If you are using an online platform such as Animoto, submit a copy of your movie link on Google Classroom (Do not just hand in the Animoto home page link).

Finding information for your documentary:

- You will be given a textbook chapter in class that will provide you with basic information. To achieve reasonable marks, you must include your own research.
