Deputies' Report

Following the distribution of Semester 1 reports, our parent teacher interviews were well attended. Staff provide parents and students with valuable feedback through reports and interviews. As we move into Semester 2, students are encouraged to use this valuable feedback to work to achieve personal excellence. There are a small number of student reports that have yet to be collected. The reports are available from the front office.

It is a Department of Education requirement that students attend school every day on time. Presently, there are a number of students where attendance and lateness are a concern. Following initial intervention from the school, if there are no significant improvements to lateness and attendance, students will be referred to the Home School Liaison Officer. Interviews are currently being undertaken by the Home School Liaison Officer to improve lateness and attendance.

GRC Peakhurst Campus is a uniform school. All students are expected to wear full school uniform including black leather shoes to school each day. Due to the recent cold weather, a small number of students have been wearing non uniform items. The school would like parents to support our uniform policy and ensure that their children are wearing correct uniform when they leave each morning. Students are encouraged to wear layers during colder weather – including both the school jumper and jacket. The P&C operates a second hand uniform shop each Wednesday morning at the schools front office.

Items of uniform on sale are heavily discounted. The P&C would welcome any donations to the uniform shop as all profits are returned to purchase school resources.

On Thursday 11th August, Year 8 students and their parents are invited to attend the Stage 5 Elective Information Evening in the School Hall between 6pm and 7pm. This is a valuable opportunity for parents and students to hear information regarding the course requirements for the successful completion of Stage 5 (Yr 9 &10) Parents will have an opportunity to speak to representatives from each of the faculty areas offering elective subjects.

In recent weeks a number of concerned parents and community members have contacted the school regarding student safety whilst crossing roads and a number of students who don't wear helmets when riding their bikes to and from school. Our students are regularly reminded about safety considerations when travelling to and from school and when alighting from buses and vehicles. A number of students have narrowly avoided injury after carelessly running or riding across roads and pedestrian crossings without due care. Parents are requested to discuss these concerns with their child.

The opportunities available to students at GRC Peakhurst are many and varied and cater for a range of talents and interests. We wish our Dance, Aerobics teams success in the upcoming Nationals competition on the Gold Coast. A number of student camps are approaching. PASS camp will occur during Week 8 and Leadership camp will occur during Week 9. Our students are also working hard preparing our annual PEAKFORM performance to be held on Friday 2nd September.

We would like to congratulate all members of the school community who contributed to the successful Launch of Education Week 2016. Year 10 Photography and Digital Media Report

Year 10 Photography and Digital Media class has been working extremely hard on a number of assessment tasks so far this year. Their latest task on the topic – 'People and Places' demonstrated their amazing skills they have learnt using the program Photoshop and the use of the DSLR camera. Each student produced a Body of Work consisting of 6 photographs of themselves, other people, places they have visited as well as everyday objects. I would like to commend each and every student in the class for presenting outstanding work and being successful in completing this assessment.

I will leave you with a report from one of our very talented PDM student Alex to give you a rundown of the assessment task:-

Both Year 10 Photography and Digital Media classes have been very busy this term working on a number of assessment tasks and completing work for our annual exhibition 'Peakview'.

Our Year 10 Photography and Digital Media class researched many techniques of Photo editing and watched various YouTube demonstration videos and applied them to many images that they had taken. The themes researched were Multiplicity, the Invisible Man, Levitation, Double Exposure, Tiny Planet, Fake Spoke, Hands to Face, Illusion photography and various filters and APPS on I pads were all used in different ways. We all really enjoyed using Photoshop to edit our photographs and we really loved the final outcome.

Year 9 Ceramics Report

Our assessment task for Ceramics is worth 25% of our total mark. Our task was to design and create a coil hand built ceramic form. Some of the class decided to make plates, bowls and even vases. I decided to use a mould to help with my construction.

First, I designed my clay form in my ceramic diary. I then started with rolling clay out and feeding this into a machine called a clay extruder to create even in thickness clay coils. To join these together I scored the clay with a clay tool and put it in the mould and connected the clay together and I was careful to smooth my joins and edges. I then repeated this process over, until I got the result I needed. Once completed, I needed to leave my clay out in the open to dry for at least a week and a half. My clay ceramic form measured 20 cm tall and 15 cm wide.

After it completely dried, I put my work into the big clay oven called a kiln to bisque. After this firing process, I rubbed black oxide on the clay work, giving my work an 'aged' finish. I then added a top coat of clear glaze on the inside of the work and placed my work in the kiln again to glaze fire. This gave my piece a shiny finish.

The other half of the class made cardboard sculptures. The materials they used were cardboard rolls, corrugated cardboard, cardboard boxes, PVA glue and hot glue. We looked at Naum Gabo for ideas and inspiration. As a class we all learnt how to draw continuous line drawings and we drew portraits of each other using this technique. Debating

Debating and Public Speaking Report

Welcome back to an incredibly busy Term 3. In two short weeks we have already hosted the local Legacy Public Speaking final at our school with two of our own students (Laura Bancroft and Tayanytah Iverach) participating and doing us proud. Please read on to hear Jack Appleby's report on the day.

Legacy Junior Public Speaking Comp

Today's final of the Legacy Public Speaking Award was a great day that began with a few late comers, but was overall a successful day. The day started off with a bang with a student named Hazel. Hazel gave a speech on Generational Theft and Inequality. It was a very interesting speech that brought up very contemporary ideas on how we as the millennial generation cannot afford things and how we are stereotyped as lazy. She believes that all political decisions are short-sighted.

Next up was one of our own students, Laura Bancroft, speaking about a prevalent issue, that being the Miscarriage of Justice towards Sexual Assault victims. She put forth many alarming statistics, like how 1 in 5 victims of sexual assault reports their assault. This means that 4 in 5 victims stay quiet. She also gave examples of when the justice system fails its victims.

After Laura, was a student from Meriden School, and her topic was on Energy Poverty. It was a riveting speech that gave us all an insight into how many people live without energy: that figure being around 1.2 billion people. That roughly equates to 60 times more people than the population of Australia. This is an alarming number of people in the world that do not have the things that we take for granted.

Next up was Lara, with her topic on Family Migration. She gave a personal account of how her grandparents arrived in Australia. She continued to outline the advantages of multiculturalism.

Next up was a student with a topic on how Laughter is the Best Medicine. She outlined what laughter is, while also proposing famous theories on how laughter can make you feel better, and also how laughter can sometimes burn more calories than when you run for an hour. She also said how laughter in a group can help strengthen bonds.

After that was Michael, from Sydney Grammar School, with a topic that was about 'Movies that Matter'.

Next up was another one of our own, Tayanytah Iverach, with a topic on Autism. She outlined the struggles of Autistic people,

while detailing the causes. She gave a personal account of a family friend that has autism. She proposed a way that all human beings can understand autism better.

Next up was Alana from Meriden School, with a speech on Food Wastage. She outlined the danger of food wastage, while detailing the environmental effects. She outlined how in France, they have passed laws to prevent companies from banning perceived 'ugly' foods.

After that was Shanny from Sydney Girls, with the topic Zero to Hero. She outlined how everyone can be a hero, no matter what you do. It's the little things that make a big difference.

Next up was Sophia, with a topic of Chequebook Journalism. She gave a personal account of how her brother earned a little cash by filming a fire for the news. She also gave the example of Tara Brown's failed kidnap attempt, and how Channel 9 paid their way out of it. This was a very interesting speech that was my personal favourite.

That was the most informative hour of my life.

Impromptu speeches followed. The topic was 'The road not taken', which was quite a difficult topic for all the contestants to speak on for 2 minutes, after only receiving 5 minutes of preparation time.

The adjudicator then retired to a room to decide the result of the contest.
