## From the Principal

This school term is highlighted by ongoing formal assessments and the reporting of student learning across all the key learning areas within the school. Formal assessments are seen as an opportunity for students to demonstrate their understanding of the course work explored within every classroom throughout this semester. Student learning will be mapped against course performance descriptors to determine the standard of achievement in each subject area. It is important for all students to reflect on the feedback provided to them by their respective teachers. The feedback provided to each student in each subject is designed to constructively outline ways to further improve their performance and understanding of the course work studied in the classroom. The emphasis at all times is about 'continuous and ongoing improvement'.

As reported in the previous edition of the school newsletter, our school community was required to participate in an External Validation process that required the school to self-assess the educational systems, processes, teaching and learning programs currently used within the school against the Department of Education School Excellence Framework in the areas of Learning, Teaching and Leadership. The school leadership team worked strategically with a focus and a purpose that was compelling and challenging. The end goal at all times was about student learning and high impact improvement in all aspects of school life. Everything revolved around evidence collection and reflections on student performance data. The school leadership team was characterised by the strong positive and professional relationships that created alignment, trust and support at all times. This led to spirals of inquiry where current educational practices were questioned and further examined. The entire process proved to highly productive and very beneficial for individual members of the school leadership team and the entire school learning community.

On Tuesday 17th October, 2017 an independent External Validation panel attended the school to conduct a review of the

school's evidence and overall findings. After careful examination and analysis of the evidence presented by our school, the panel concluded that our school was very accurate in our self-assessment and consistent with the evidence provided when mapped and validated against the DoE School Excellence Framework in all the domains of Learning, Teaching and Leadership. The feedback provided by the panel was very insightful and constructive. This process has provided an ideal framework for the school leadership team and the school learning community to reflect on how to be effective in the design of strategic initiatives to bring about school improvement in the upcoming School Plan 2018 - 2020. On behalf of our school learning community, I congratulate the entire school leadership team for their productive educational contributions, collaboration, professionalism and effective leadership throughout the entire External Validation process (May -September). A meritorious mention to Scott Wilson (DP), Christine Keir (DP), Peta Holm (HT Special Ed), Neridah Hill (HT PDHPE), Patrick Fisher (English), Aaron Morley (PDHPE), Monique Van De Pol (LaST), Nick Zouroudis (HT English) and Joanne Jarvis (GRC Principal).

Moving forward, we are currently reviewing our School Plan 2015 - 2017 and about to enter into the consultation stage with all the school stakeholders for the new School Plan 2018 - 2020. An integral part of this process involves a review of the current consultation draft of the Department of Education Strategic Plan 2018 - 2020. The DoE Vision is: 'To be Australia's best education system and one of the finest in the world'. The DoE Mission is: 'To prepare young people to lead rewarding and productive lives in a complex and dynamic world'. In general, the goals of the DoE are to ensure students make a strong start in life and learning and make a successful transition to school. Every student is known, valued and cared for in our school. Every student, every teacher, every leader and every school improves every year. Every student is engaged and challenged to continue to learn. All young people have a strong foundation in literacy and numeracy, deep content knowledge and confidence in their ability to learn, adapt and be responsible citizens. All young people finish school well prepared for higher education, training and work. Our staff and teachers are of the highest calibre. Our school infrastructure

meets the needs of a growing population and enables future focused learning and teaching. Education is a great place to work and community confidence in Public Education is high.

In conclusion, the DoE vision statement, mission statement and goals are the foundation upon which we build for the future and at the forefront of everything we do in learning and teaching at GRC Peakhurst Campus!

# **Deputies' Report**

With Term 4 well under way, students are currently completing ACER testing, yearly exams and final assessment tasks for the Semester 2 reporting schedule. As students work towards their final assessments, it is important that students continue to work to the best of their ability until the last day of Term 4. After assessment tasks are completed, teachers are preparing students for the 2017 school year. Parents are encouraged to ensure that their child/children attend school every day in full school uniform, complete all assigned work and continue to adhere to our school values of respect, responsibility and excellence.

Year 10 will be participating in a number of transition programs in preparation for enrolment at GRC Oatley in 2017. On Tuesday 28th November, identified Year 10 students will be involved in the Jumpstart Transition Program at Oatley Senior Campus. On Monday 4th December, all Year 10 will participate in a compulsory orientation program at the senior campus. All students are expected to arrive prior to 8:30 a.m. and be in full school uniform. The Oatley orientation is organised to assist students in understanding the processes, procedures and expectations of senior studies and allow students to meet their 2018 peers.

Lateness to school has become an issue for some students. Unfortunately, when students are late to school they are missing valuable information and learning time. We encourage parents to ensure that students leave home each morning in time to arrive at school prior to the 8:40 a.m. bell.

GRC Peakhurst has a strong uniform policy where all students are expected to wear the correct school uniform each day. Students not in correct uniform are encouraged to bring a note from a parent explaining why they are not in correct uniform. These students will be offered items of correct uniform to wear for the day to uphold our high standard of uniform. Please ensure that these items are washed and returned to the school ready to be worn by other students, if necessary. GRC Peakhurst Campus uniforms can be purchased at Lowes – Hurstville / Roselands. Alternatively, the P&C operate a small 2nd hand uniform store each Wednesday morning from 8:00 am. Parents are encouraged to donate any uniforms that are too small for their child to the P&C's uniform store. Any monies raised in the store goes back into school resources.

Students are regularly reminded at weekly assemblies that their behaviour, both within the school and within the wider community, is important and should reflect our school values of respect, responsibility and excellence. We ask parents to talk to their children about expected behaviours when travelling to and from school on public transport and whilst waiting for public transport in the community. Poor behaviour by a few students in the community reflects negatively on the whole school community. Please encourage your child to wait quietly for public transport and act respectfully and responsibly whilst travelling to and from school.

Georges River College Peakhurst Campus not only caters for the academic needs of the child but ensures that its students are given a diverse curriculum and a breadth of extra-curricular opportunities to meet the social and emotional needs of young people. It is our focus to equip students with the important life skills they need to be leaders and responsible participants in a rapidly changing world.

Over the last month, our well-being programs have continued to run through the assistance of our community partners.

This term, Riverwood Community Centre commenced a Life Skills program with selected Year 7 students. Research consistently shows that students who regularly attend school have increased learning and well-being outcomes. At GRC Peakhurst, we are continually monitoring attendance rates with an expectation that all students are attending school unless they have a legitimate reason to be away such as being ill. If a student is absent from school, there is an expectation that the absence is explained by either writing a letter outlining the absence, by calling or sending an SMS to the school. Unexplained absences are closely monitored and if an absence is not explained, parents will receive a letter requesting an explanation for the absence. Year 10 students who are absent on days when assessment tasks are due or on days when in-class assessment or exams take place, require a doctor's certificate to be presented on the first day they return to school.
