From the Principal

The recent Higher School Certificate reforms have resulted in the introduction of new syllabuses for HSC English, Mathematics, Science and History. These sweeping changes were released in February 2017 and include a renewed focus on writing and grammar skills. The NSW Government's, 'Stronger HSC Standards' reforms for the 19 new Stage 6 syllabuses, released by the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA), will be updating the knowledge and skills that students will be developing for the future workplace and further study.

The aim of these reforms is to provide HSC students with a richer learning experience and provide time for students to engage with subjects in more depth as they develop a greater mastery of knowledge and skills. The introduction of these 19 new syllabuses will ensure currency, reliability, continuing integrity and significance of the HSC credential. There will be a major shift towards greater depth, rigour and mastery of content learning.

Feedback from more than 7000 teachers, students, professional associations, industry representatives and academics indicates overwhelmingly support for the new syllabuses. According to NESA, these changes will reduce the scope of subjects and allow students to think more critically.

The 19 new Stage 6 syllabuses will be taught to Year 11 students from 2018 and to Year 12 students from 2019.

Some basic features of the updated content in the courses are briefly highlighted below. English students will no longer be required to study texts through a theme such as 'Journeys' of 'Belonging' and instead focus more on the text itself. There will also be a compulsory unit on writing in all English courses. In the Mathematics Extension courses, statistics will be included in the calculus units. This is a reflection of the growing importance of data analysis in the modern workplace. The calculus based Mathematics syllabuses have been released in final draft to allow for further, targeted consultation. For science, there will be a greater focus on maths and quantitative analytical content. For History, the importance of Australia's western heritage will be emphasised under topics including the Enlightenment and the Industrial Revolutions. The focus on World War One will be expanded to look at the years between the wars and examine events from a European and an Asian perspective. New Life Skills syllabuses have been developed for English, Mathematics, Science, Modern History and Ancient History to ensure the content and skills in all syllabuses is appropriate for students with special educational needs.

These changes are imperative as people need to prepare for change resulting from emerging technologies. In the modern workplace, people must become part of the process of continual reinvention – reinventing the person, reinventing the role and reinventing areas of interest. How can people best prepare for the future of employment? Soft skills such as communication, teamwork, leadership, agility of mindsets, creative problem-solving and resilience are still very important, as are motivation, an openness to learning and a willingness to change. These skills, combined with specific professional / industry expertise, are the keys to adapting to the multiple roles one is likely to experience throughout their career. A broad range of skills will always assist in supporting and equipping people approaching work differently within a variety of workplace settings.

Everyone needs to continue improving due to the profound changes that are taking place in both society and the workplace. Our world is becoming increasingly complex. Therefore, higher levels of educational achievement will be needed to simplify this increasing level of complexity. Through education, people deepen their understanding and add meaning to their life through growth mindsets, the development of new skills and competencies. As a school, we continue to ensure all our efforts are based around lifting the quality of teaching and learning to improve the educational outcomes for all our students.

CAPA

Over the past term and a half the Year 10 Ceramics class has been busy working on a Body of Work based on Alice in Wonderland. We were lucky enough to purchase new ceramic slip casting moulds and glazes with the generous support of the P&C. The class worked hard to create wonderful bodies of work for their assessment task and I'm very proud of the results. The CAPA department is very thankful to our P&C for the purchase of this new equipment.

Below is Laura's Report on the task.

I have been working on two slip cast ceramic items and one press mould ceramic item. My first slip cast mould is largely based on the 'Queen of Hearts' from the movie Alice in Wonderland. It is a large coffee cup that has been under glazed with this pattern. The painted detail is intricate and took a lot of time.

My second work is another slip cast mould that is also based on the 'Queen of Hearts'. It is a subtle more natural version of her face. My third work is a bowl that is a press mould. On the inside of the bowl is a swirl of purple and black, to symbolise when Alice fell down the rabbit hole. On the outside my work is painted summer blue, there are various elements of Alice in Wonderland such as bunny ears, a clock and a bottle of potion that Alice drinks.

As a class, we really enjoyed working on this practical assessment task as we learnt a new technique of slip casting which was fun and creative.

Leadership by the River

GRC Peakhurst is participating in a newly founded program named, 'Leadership by the River'. This program will develop the leaders within our school. The Student Wellbeing Team is responsible, along with all members of staff, to ensure that student wellbeing is a high priority within Georges River College Peakhurst Campus. The Student Wellbeing Team proactively engages with all students individually, in small groups or in year groups to actively promote cognitive, emotional, social, physical and spiritual wellbeing. Students may work with the Year Advisor, the Deputy Principal, the school counsellor or other agencies where appropriate.

The GRC Peakhurst Wellbeing Team creates and delivers exciting programs and initiatives that provide students with opportunities in leadership, mentoring, public speaking, increasing their self-esteem and many other self-awareness activities.

Student Wellbeing Committee – This student committee is actively involved in the promotion of Social Justice Initiatives. A volunteer group of students regularly speak at our formal assemblies and write articles that are published in our schools newsletters. This group is also responsible for activities to promote anti violence against women for White Ribbon Day. These students make posters, sell ribbons, produce videos and run whole school assemblies to support this cause.

School Chaplain – In 2017, Georges River College Peakhurst Campus welcomed Tom Ayres as our new school chaplain. Tom works at GRC Peakhurst each Tuesday providing pastoral care and support to a range of students.

School Partnerships - In 2017 Georges River Life Care are running many student based programs including the Shine Program and Strength Program across Years 7–9. The Shine Program is an 8 week program for selected female students in Years 7 and 8 held at the school each Thursday afternoon. The program builds on student strengths, looks at self-respect, personal appearance, health, resilience, managing emotions and making students aware of cyber bullying.

Strength Program – Is a 7 week program for male students in Year 9, facilitated by Tom Ayres (our school chaplain) and two other Youth Workers from Georges River Life Care. Students benefit from the program in the following ways: building on student strengths and respect for self and others, resilience, partying safe, valuing and respecting women and planning for school studies. These activities help empower students with the positive tools for success in the future.

Georges River College Peakhurst Campus has also continued our successful partnership with 3 Bridges Community Hurstville through running the Own It Program for Boys in Years 8 and 9. This program allows participants to explore and challenge themselves to be leaders in their own lives. The program empowers students to take responsibility for their behaviour, life choices, life circumstances and provides opportunities for them to become leaders. This year, 3 Bridges has also commenced the Drumbeat program for selected Year 7 students.

As part of the PBL (Positive Behaviour for Learning) initiative, all students are invited to place merit cards that they have received for being respectful, responsible and aiming for excellence in a twice a term rewards draw for a gift voucher of their choice to the value of \$20.
