The process is a self-assessment procedure using the Department of Education's School Excellence Framework as a key point in the cycle of continuous improvement in all schools across NSW.

The school will undertake this process as part of the ongoing practice to support our decision making as outlined in our current School Plan 2105 – 2017. Embedding this self-assessment practice ensures we are engaged in decision-making that is informed by evidence. Our school has been provided with the opportunity to discuss our judgements about our school systems, processes and practices using evidence that underpins the validity of such judgements. This professional discussion and presentation will be conducted by

our nominated school team for an external panel comprising of peer principals.

As part of the school external validation submission, our school must submit carefully selected and robust evidence sets to clearly demonstrate and support the school's judgement across the School Excellence Framework. All selected evidence must be annotated and analysed to support the school's judgement and show how it links to the current school plan. The annotated evidence sets will critically and accurately analyse school systems, processes, projects, policies and programs. The evidence must clearly demonstrate school growth and progression. High impact must be evident through the use of supporting quantitative and qualitative data. Also, the future direction must be clearly articulated in the analysis of the evidence sets.

The evidence sets being prepared for the school presentation include; Student Learning and Student Achievement, Student Learning Support & Transition; Student Wellbeing; Targeted Professional Learning; Student Enrichment Learning; Positive Behaviour Learning; Community Links and GRC Collaborative Practices. The team of teachers working collaboratively to present our findings include: Mr Vallis; Mr Wilson; Ms Keir; Ms Hill; Ms Holm; Mr Fisher; Mr Zouroudis; Ms Van De Pol and Mr Morley. As a team, we are very excited in undertaking this process of self-assessment and self-reflection. As a school community, we look forward to sharing our findings with all the school stakeholders!

Deputies' Report

Year 8 subject selection information sessions were held for students on Tuesday 8th August during periods 4 and 5 and for parents later that evening in our school hall. The parent session was very well attended and outlined information regarding subjects available in 2018, the subject selection process and the successful completion of the Record of School Achievement (RoSA). Parents and students had an opportunity to speak to staff about the electives on offer with staff able to highlight the many courses available to students in 2018. Next year, Year 9 will complete three electives which they will continue in Year 10 (2019). A number of new courses were offered bringing the number of courses available to 18, a very impressive variety and number for a school of our size.

Parents are reminded that GRC Peakhurst has its own Skoolbag app to alert parents of upcoming events and also to notify them of the provision of assessment tasks to students. Alerts are sent to your device via the app when an event is approaching or when an assessment task is provided to your child. The alert will provide a direct link to more detailed information which has been posted on the school website. The app can be downloaded free of charge from the Apple App, Google Play or Windows stores. Instructions on how to download the school app can be found on the school website.

GRC Peakhurst is a uniform school and students are expected to wear the correct uniform to school each day. We can only maintain our high standards with the support of parents. Please

ensure your children have the correct uniform and wear it to school each day including the correct footwear. If you are unsure of correct uniform items, please look in your child's diary or on the school's website or contact the school. We expect that all students take responsibility for their uniform and wear it with pride each day. In addition to uniform, lateness to school has also become an issue for some students. Unfortunately, when students are late to school they are missing valuable information and learning time. We encourage parents to ensure that students leave home each morning in time to arrive at school prior to the 8:40 a.m. bell.

Students are encouraged to recognise that our values of respect, responsibility and excellence extend beyond the school and/or classroom setting and into the wider community. Being ethical digital citizens and members of the community is particularly pertinent given the increasing impact social media continues to have on student mental health and wellbeing, and the flow on effect this has in the classroom and community at large.

Incidents of students sending inappropriate messages and images via social media are becoming an increasing concern. Often this activity happens outside of school, however, the consequences of these matters quickly filter back into the school grounds and impact students upon their return. Parents are encouraged to closely monitor their children's online activity and remind them of the consequences of posting inappropriate content online. Students need to understand the gravity of their actions because once material is posted on social media, it is near impossible to retrieve the content and prevent further circulation.

Families are also reminded of the guidelines and stipulations outlined in our school's ICT Policy and User Agreement (available for download on the school website). Students caught in breach of our ICT policy will be expected to hand in their device when requested by a teacher and may be required to hand in their mobile device each morning for an extended period of time.

WELLBEING TEAM REPORT

Georges River College Peakhurst Campus is committed to the well-being of all students in the school by providing a positive and nurturing learning environment where all students are valued. Student well-being underpins all teaching and learning programs in an atmosphere of care and concern. Georges River College Peakhurst Campus not only caters for the academic needs of the child but ensures that its students are given a diverse curriculum and a breadth of extra-curricular opportunities to meet the social and emotional needs of young people. It is our focus to equip students with the important life skills they need to be leaders and responsible participants in a rapidly changing world.

On Thursday 10th August Year 8 students participated in a Year Advisor Program Anti Bullying session – Cyberia. The session covered cyber bullying, digital citizenship, social websites, internet security, exclusion, alienation, isolation, responsible use of technology, internet addiction, impulse control and online reputation.

On Tuesday 29th August Year 9 students participated in a Year Advisor Program Anti Bullying session. The theatre based anti-bullying session in one of many programs and initiatives in place to reduce the incidences of bullying and improve student behaviour and wellbeing.

Over the last month, our range of wellbeing programs have continued to run through the assistance of our community partners.

Throughout August, the Shine Program continued for a group of Yr 7 students focusing on resilience, managing emotions and making students aware of cyber bullying. The program builds on student strengths, looks at self respect, personal appearance, health and wellbeing.

Our School Chaplian Tom Ayres has commenced his Term 3 program with a new group of Yr 9 boys. The Strength program builds on student strengths and respect for self and others, resilience, safe partying, valuing and respecting women and planning for school studies. These activities help empower students with the positive tools for success in the future. Tom continues to work with range of GRC Peakhurst Students each Tuesday, providing individual and group mentoring and running a range of wellbeing programs.

3 Bridges Community Hurstville are currently completing their Term 3 Own It programs with Yr 7 Boys and Yr 8/9 girls. This program allows participants to explore and challenge themselves to be leaders in their own lives. The program empowers students to take responsibility for their behaviours, life choices, life circumstances and provides opportunities for them to become leaders. Students will spend their last session of this program visiting the Hurstville Youth Centre.

As part of the PBL (Positive Behaviour for Learning) initiative, all students are invited to place merit cards that they have received for being respectful, responsible and aiming for excellence in a twice a term rewards draw for a gift voucher of their choice to the value of \$20. Our Student Wellbeing Team and Ms Walton are continuing to plan and prepare for our Annual White Ribbon Initiative (a campaign to prevent violence against women) for later in the year. All students are encouraged to get on board with the White Ribbon Initiative and show their support by joining or assisting the student wellbeing committee. Interested students are requested to see Ms Walton.

Research consistently shows that students who regularly attend school have increased learning and wellbeing outcomes. At GRC Peakhurst, we are continually monitoring attendance rates with an expectation that all students are attending school unless they have a legitimate reason to be away such as being ill. If a student is absent from school, there is an expectation that the absence is explained by either writing a letter outlining the absence, sending an sms to the school or calling the school. Unexplained absences are closely monitored and if an absence is not explained, parents will receive a letter requesting an explanation for the absence. Yr 10 Students who are absent on days where assessment tasks are due or on days where in class assessment or exams take place – require a doctors certificate to be presented the first day they return to school.

STUDENT WELLBEING REPORT

The Student Wellbeing Committee is a safe environment where we talk about relevant issues that may occur within our school, workplace or community and how we can help to raise awareness. For example, we are in the process of planning White Ribbon Day, which is coming up very soon.
