Deputies' Report

Welcome to 2018. In particular, we would like to welcome the new parents to our school, especially our Year 7 parents. We trust that over the next four years, we can develop a positive relationship with you to ensure the best learning outcomes for your child are achieved.

We have had some fantastic school community events with our students' impressive sporting skills and enthusiastic house spirit demonstrated at the swimming carnival and our staff and students' genuine school pride showcased at a very successful Open Night. The school community events will continue with our Year 7 Meet the Teacher Evening held on Tuesday 13th March, from 5:00 - 6.30pm. This will be held outside the school hall and will include a sausage sizzle and informal discussion with staff. We hope that you take this opportunity to meet with your child's teachers and gain valuable insight into how we will assist your child to achieve their personal best. Year 7 Progress Reports will also be distributed to parents on the night.

Positive Behaviour for Learning, known as PBL, is an integral part of Georges River College Peakhurst Campus. Through consultation with staff, parents, students and the wider community, a set of values has been developed and agreed upon that underpin the day to day operations of our school. We value, Respect, Responsibility and Excellence at GRC Peakhurst. We encourage parents to discuss these values with their children. Specific information regarding our values and expectations can be found in student diaries, on the school website and through a whole series of new signage across our school environment. By sending your child to Georges River College Peakhurst Campus, you should be aware that we are a uniform school. To demonstrate the value of Responsibility, it is the student's responsibility to wear their full uniform to school each day. We encourage parents to ensure their child / children comply with our uniform policy. Students who take pride in their uniform also show Respect and pride in their school.

All year groups have now been provided with their **2018** Assessment Guide. This guide contains important and valuable information on assessment procedures and outlines specific assessment tasks for each subject area. Parents are requested to read the additional assessment procedures leaflet, sign and return it to your child's year adviser as soon as possible. The assessment guides are also available on the school website. In addition to the assessment tasks and homework activities, students are expected to engage in independent learning (see description and suggested examples below), to consolidate what has been learnt during lessons at school. Suggested times for homework each night is:

- Year 7 One hour
- Year 8 One hour
- Year 9 One and a half hours
- Year 10 Two hours or more

HOMEWORK AND INDEPENDENT LEARNING

Some students take a long time to realise that there are actually two types of work in secondary school. There is the obvious work, the work your teacher specifically tells you to do and that is compulsory such as homework, working on assignments, preparing for tests and assessments. Students who get good results in school take a larger measure of **responsibility** for their learning. This means that the nights where they do not have much compulsory work, they also do independent learning. These are the additional things you do, if you have no other schoolwork to do that night, to improve your understanding of your subjects. It is what students who achieve sound to outstanding marks are doing, they are just not talking about it to their friends.

Examples of independent learning:

- Reading
- Reviewing what you have been learning at school that week
- Extra practise on questions you find hard

- Research on an area you are interested in learning more about
- Making a mind map about what you have been learning
- Making study notes on a topic
- Improving your touch typing skills
- Reading ahead in your textbook
- Doing work from a different textbook or study guide for one of your subjects (check the school library, local library and bookshops).

Some nights you will not have time to do any independent learning. Other nights you will have no homework and will spend the whole time allocated to schoolwork for that night working on independent learning tasks. Your teacher may even give you a sheet that has suggestions of independent learning work for that subject. If you are unsure, you can always ask. This means in secondary school you can never say 'I have nothing to do' – this really just means 'I have nothing compulsory to do at the moment!'

To support our students with their assessment tasks and homework, a **Homework Centre** operates each Monday and Tuesday afternoon in the School Library from 3:00 – 4:00 pm. We encourage parents to remind their child/children of this excellent resource.

We look forward to working with you and your children this year and invite you to contact the Year Advisor or the Deputy Principals if you have any concerns.

Stage 5 begins in Year 9 and ends in Year 10 with the attainment of the ROSA- Record of school Achievement.

As students begin the new stage they will need to be aware of the requirements for each subject. If any student has any questions about what is expected, they should ask their teachers or Head Teacher of the subject area.

TIPS FOR SUCCESS

- 1. Be organised.
- 2. Use your school diary for organisation or recording important information or communication.
- 3. Ensure you have all the necessary equipment for each subject.
- 4. Download the school app and update the notifications to alert you as needed for assessment tasks, events and important information.
- 5. Assessment notifications are available on the school website for each subject and are uploaded as they distributed to students.
- 6. Ask for help as you need it from your teachers.
- Utilise the homework centre which operates on Monday and Tuesday afternoons between 3.05-4.00 pm in the library. Ms Diamond in the HSIE faculty is in charge of the centre and you can see her if you need information.
- 8. Establish a study routine early and revise coursework regularly, read different texts and ensure that assessment tasks are started early within the two week period before the due date.

NAPLAN 2018

NAPLAN will take place during May 2018 and students will be advised of the exact dates.

Music

Last year was a bumper year for our Music Students here at GRC Peakhurst Campus. We sent five acts to audition as featured artists for the 2017 Schools Spectacular. We had the honor of two of our students being accepted as featured artists for the 2017 show, a result normally seen in the premier Performing Arts Schools in the State.

Numi Tugaga and James Polutele performed to 120,000 people at the Qudos Bank Arena over four amazing shows and to an estimated television audience of over 1.2 million people. If you were not aware, the Schools Spectacular is a large scale contemporary variety show operated by the NSW Department of Education's Arts Unit. The Schools Spectacular has launched the careers of many Australian Artists.

This year we are planning to put forward more of our outstanding GRC Peakhurst talent. We will be videoing and recording our students in a local studio to give them the best opportunity to present well for their audition.

2107 CAPA Camp

In the final week of School last year we hosted a two day CAPA Camp at The Tops Conference Centre. The camp was attended by over 200 students from across the College. Students enjoyed some amazing practical learning sessions in Visual Arts, Music and Drama from our guest presenters and our own GRC staff, as well as some fun outdoor activities and the opportunity to make friends with students from the other campuses.

Elective Music 2018

We are excited to have more students studying Music than ever before. This year see's two Year 9 elective classes, with a large percentage of this very talented year group deciding to pursue their musical studies. Currently Year 9 is involved in studying Jazz music during this first term. The students will be learning how to compose songs, enhance their performance skills and develop their musical ear, all in the context of building their musical literacy. Later this year, both Years 9 and 10 will get to visit a recording studio to experience how the Music Industry works and to record their own original songs.

Peakform 2018

Our Schools premier music event, Peakform is now in the advanced planning stages and is looking to be the best show ever. Our goal is to present original material from our student songwriters, alongside songs from artists who started a new musical trend and some of the popular chart songs of today. The show will be held in September and tickets will be available at the beginning of Term 2.

Our GRC Band Program has been operating for a number of years and this year we have decided to partner with an experienced company YULE MUSIC to assist us to grow the band and further develop the skills of our students. Earlier this term, Andy Yule from Yule Music, came and presented to all of our Year 7, 8 and Elective Music students. We plan to be involved in the Engadine Bandfest, Education Week performances at local venues and concerts for some of our local Primary Schools.

The new GRC Concert Band will now rehearse on a Tuesday after school from 3.30pm till 5.00pm. The program will consist of a 30 minute tutorial session for each section of the band followed by a 60 minute rehearsal.

Our new program will be operated by the YULE Music Team and supervised by the Band Director, Mr David Reidy.

The Vocal Ensemble

The English faculty works very closely with Ms K. Nguyen and Ms M. Lam who are the school's EAL/D teachers. Ms K. Nguyen is an experienced EAL/D teacher who works closely with all EAL/D and international students. Ms M. Lam also teaches EAL/D students as well as teaching Japanese language classes. Our EAL/D teachers work collaboratively in a team teaching environment, and provide assistance in individual and small group settings.

The various members of the English staff offer a diverse range of experience as well as immense enthusiasm to their roles as English teachers. Mr P. Fisher taught at Menai High School prior to his appointment at GRC Peakhurst and is currently involved in cross-campus teaching at GRC Oatley Senior Campus. Ms L. Osmond taught at GRC Oatley Campus as well as GRC Peakhurst Campus. Mr P. Fisher and Ms L. Osmond recently marked the extended writing response for NAPLAN and their experience has been shared with the entire faculty. Ms L. Dunstan also taught at GRC Oatley prior to teaching at GRC Peakhurst. Ms A. Talevski, Ms K. Eleos and Mr N. Zouroudis bring a wealth of experience to the faculty having taught Years 7 to 12 at their previous schools, including extensive experience in marking School Certificate and HSC English.

The faculty offers Debating and Public Speaking as extra-curricular activities. The teachers responsible for selecting, training and managing these teams are Ms L.

Osmond. Ms L. Dunstan and Mr P. Fisher. In recent years, the school has achieved great success in debating, highlighted by the success of the Junior and Senior Debating teams that were Zone Champions in 2017 and the immense achievement of the Junior team in 2016 which competed in the Sydney Regional Final for the Premier's Debating Challenge.

The English Faculty focuses on offering a differentiated curriculum which meets the needs of the diverse students in the school. In Year 7, there is a renewed focus on text types, grammar and punctuation as well as extensive reading within the coursework and through the Home Reading and Homework programs. In Year 8, student conceptual understanding and literacy skills are extended through close study of a diverse range of literature and media. In Year 9, Stage 5 concepts are introduced and extended upon in Year 10. In Year 10, the focus is on completing Stage 5 work but also on preparing students for Preliminary and HSC studies in English.

The faculty encourages and promotes wide reading for Years 7 to 10. The expectation is that students read for thirty minutes during the weeknights. Recently, the school has invested in purchasing new texts that will be available in the library for borrowing. To support the wide reading program, there will be competitions held for each of the Year groups that will involve them in creating imaginative and critical responses to the texts.

If parents or guardians have any questions regarding their child's progress in English, they should contact the school and speak to their child's English teacher.

HSIE

The H.S.I.E faculty welcomes all students and caregivers to a new academic year.

The faculty itself has seen a number of changes for 2018, with the arrival of Ms S. Schenk, Ms D. Cvijetic and Mr A. Sallis to the H.S.I.E. team. Ms H. Diamond has returned to her usual position as the Head Teacher of the Department. Mr A. Sarandos and Ms M. Hamilton, existing, talented members of staff, make up the rest of the H.S.I.E. faculty.

A key component of all H.S.I.E courses is the development of:

- A social and ethical understanding of past, current and future issues,
- An understanding and awareness of the perspectives of Indigenous Cultures,
- Communication skills when using technology
- Literacy and numeracy skills,
- Thorough and discerning research skills,
- Independent, group learning and problem-solving skills.

H.S.I.E. or the Human Society and Its Environment department, teaches History and Geography courses to all students from Year 7 to Year 10. In addition, the faculty also offers Commerce and History Elective to Year 9 and 10 students as one of their elective choices.

With the adoption of the NSW History and Geography version of the Australian Curriculum, students of History follow a continuum from prehistoric and ancient times in Year 7 through to the Medieval Western and Islamic World in Year 8. Other societies such as the development of civilisation in Ancient China, Medieval Japan and the collapse of Aztec society are also covered during Year 7 and 8.

Year 9 and Year 10, focusing upon modern Australia, begins with the growth of nations, the Industrial Revolution and the period prior to the First World War. Students are encouraged to gain an understanding of the causes and nature of the war with a focus study on the campaigns involving the ANZAC soldiers. Following this continuum, the Great Depression and 1930s are also addressed after launching into a detailed study into World War II. Students complete Year 9 with a brief look at the Holocaust and the treatment of different cultural and ethnic groups under the Nazi regime.

Year 10 History begins with the establishment of the United Nations and the events concerning the Cold War and our increasing solidarity with the U.S.A. Students also undertake a depth study into the changing lives, and government policies relating to Indigenous people, including a focus on the Stolen Generation and a comparison with civil rights movement in the U.S.A. Other focus areas include Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War, Changing Technologies and Popular Culture.

Year 7 Geography focuses upon the key depth studies of Landscapes and Landforms, and Place and Liveability. Year 8 sees students undertaking the core topics of Water and the World, and Interconnections. Like all other Geography courses, geographical skills are embedded within topics. This evolved way of teaching skills allows for students to apply their knowledge and understanding at a practical level.

As students move into Year 9, they undertake studies into Sustainable Biomes and Changing Places. Studies in Year 10 progress through a topic on Environmental Change and Management. This topic, with its coastal areas focus study, will see the year group undertaking a mandatory fieldwork excursion to the Bate Bay area in the Sutherland Shire in late March. Studies in Geography culminate with a depth topic called Human Wellbeing, including comparisons with Australian society and that of other countries

Geography assists students to develop an awareness of local, state and national issues, students will foster a greater awareness and understanding of issues currently impacting upon life at a global level.

Commerce is offered as an elective subject to students of Year 9 and 10. Throughout the two years, students study a range of useful and practical topics relating to Business, Government, Law and Consumer Finance.

Year 9 begins with an introductory unit on Spending. Next, students undertake a depth study on Consumer Choice and Personal Finance. During this year, students also undertake a Money Stuff group project and participate in the ASX Share market game. Following this theme, students then complete a topic on Promoting and Selling. The final topic in Year 9, Law and Society, provides a foundation for Year 10 studies. Year 10 Commerce begins with a key topic called Law in Action. Following on from this, students undertake a unit on Government, including mock elections and a mandatory excursion to the Police and Justice Museum, and NSW State Parliament mid-way through the year.

The H.S.I.E department also offers students from Year 9 and 10 the option of studying an additional History course as an elective. In Year 9, History Elective begins with an introductory unit on Constructing History. While studying this unit, students undertake a personal research project on an archaeological site of their choice. In late March, the class will spend an exciting day at the The Rocks area of Sydney. This guided excursion allows students to explore the remains of Australia's earliest place of European settlement.

In Term 2, students learn about the rise of Hitler and Life in Nazi Germany. This includes a critical review of the use of film in providing historical information. The class also undertakes an excursion to the Sydney Jewish Museum, where students have the chance to hear a lecture by a survivor of the Holocaust.

The next unit involves a topic entitled Heroes and Villains. Students are given the opportunity to present their research to prove that their chosen individual was the 'Greatest Villain (or Hero) in History'. The final topic in Year 9 includes a unit on the reign, legacy and wives of Henry VIII.

Year 10 History spends the first term learning about Crime and Punishment from ancient to modern times. This thematic unit looks into various aspects such as Changing Attitudes to Crime and Their Punishments, Torture, Witchcraft, Prisons, Treatment of Mental Illness and Organised Crime.

The next topic involves a study into the life of John F. Kennedy and his subsequent assassination. After studying an overview of the events leading up to and during this significant event, students are given the task of weighing up the evidence, and the potential groups and/or individuals who may have been partly or solely responsible for the assassination.

The next major topic includes a study into the History and Archaeology of the Pacific, with particular focus on the destruction of the civilisation on Easter Island. This unit on environmental history uses the case study as an example of the consequences of negligent resource use and environmental damage.

Curriculum Newsletters and Assessment

The Mathematics Faculty Curriculum Newsletter will continue to be published this year via the school website to assist parents/ carers in further supporting their children by keeping them up to date with the course content being delivered. Parents/carers are encouraged to closely monitor the completion of homework and assigned work in preparation for assessment tasks (as outlined in the assessment booklets) over the course of the year. Please note that all assessment task notifications will be uploaded to the school website and a push notification alert will be sent via the school app.

This year, homework and class tasks will contribute to students' overall assessment for all year groups. All students will have homework assigned (via booklets and online tasks) as a part of their ongoing assessment throughout the year. In addition to being expected to actively participate during lessons, students are advised to regularly attempt, complete and submit all homework tasks to consolidate what is learnt during lessons, bridge any gaps in their knowledge and fulfil all assessment requirements.

Study Tips

Systematic study and revision is an essential component necessary when aiming for excellence in Mathematics. Students are advised to develop a structured study schedule to provide them with planned sessions to regularly review course content.

A hardcopy of the study tips and strategies, included in this newsletter, has been distributed to all students to guide them in their preparation for examinations and assigned tasks. Please take the time to read through these strategies and action some of the suggestions so as to support students as they strive to build upon previous concepts necessary to learn new concepts being introduced.

Students who continue to find course content too difficult are advised to speak with their classroom teacher as soon as possible, so that additional support can be provided. Students are also encouraged to attend the Homework Centre on Monday and/or Tuesday afternoons in the School Library for additional assistance.

Mathletics

Mathletics is an interactive online computer resource which the Mathematics Faculty has been incorporating into teaching, homework and assessment programs for several years. Regular use of this online tool has proven to help students consolidate content taught during lessons, revise content at home in preparation for examinations and receive assistance at any time, using the support button, when struggling with specific concepts. Students who do not have access to the Internet at home may use the School Library during recess and lunch or when attending the Homework Centre on Monday and/or Tuesday afternoons. Alternatively, students may arrange a time with their class teacher to use the D 1.04 computer lab. The cost of this valuable resource remains at \$10 per student per year. If you have not already done so this year, please arrange for your child to pay \$10 at the front office as soon as possible.

NAPLAN

NAPLAN is fast approaching for students in Year 7 and Year 9. This year, the Numeracy component of NAPLAN will be held on Thursday 17th May 2018. Students are encouraged to practise as many NAPLAN-style questions as possible to familiarise themselves with the style of questioning and the format of the paper.

Please be advised that the format of Numeracy component of NAPLAN changed last year. The Non-Calculator component is now 10 minutes (reduced from 40 minutes) while the Calculator component is 50 minutes (increased from 40 minutes). Students will be provided with past papers and are encouraged to attempt these papers under examination conditions to best prepare for this external diagnostic assessment.

ICAS Competitions

The following competitions will be offered to students this year.

The ICAS Digital Technologies Competition will be held on Tuesday 8th May 2018 while the ICAS Mathematics Competition will be held on Tuesday 15th August 2018. The competitions are open to all students, however, it will be mandatory for all students in any Red class across Years 7 – 10.

Any student interested in participating in the Digital Technologies and/or Mathematics competitions can pick up an information note and permission slip from their Mathematics or Computing teacher. The cost of entry (per competition) is \$9.00. Payment will need to be made to the front office and permission slips are to be returned to the Mathematics Staffroom.

If you have any queries or concerns regarding matters in Mathematics or Computing classes, please don't hesitate to contact either your child's teacher (initially) or myself at the school.

Thurlow who saved the school a lot of expense in the installation of the new kitchens. We also thank Mrs C. Giles, our Kitchen Assistant who assisted in the coordination of the fit out. This team's effort is a typical example of how our school members work collaboratively to achieve positive outcomes for students. The new facilities have allowed students to experience working with equipment used in commercial kitchens. The students have also loved using the commercial dishwasher, installed late last year in room A.0.4. This year, the faculty is focusing on preparing for the new syllabus Stage 4 syllabus in Technology which will be implemented next year by undertaking several courses on coding.

The Industrial Arts department has also seen an update in the workshops. Bench tops have been replaced in a workshop and new equipment such as disk sanders and a track saw have been installed to allow students to produce quality products.

As a faculty, we look forward to working with your child this year. All Year 7 and 8 students will undertake three 15 week rotations this year that will provide them experiences with working with wood, metal, electronics, food and textiles when meeting set challenges. This term, Year 9 Food Technology are preparing special occasion foods and learning about the many celebrations of different culture and religions while Year 10 are learning about

the importance of good nutrition throughout life. The faculty appreciates the effort, these students placed in helping to prepare food for Open Night with some students in Year 9 staying back to assist on the night.

Year 9 Design and Technology is designing wooden toys with moveable parts while Year 9 Industrial Technology is constructing jewellery boxes. Year 10 Industrial Technology is making blanket boxes.

GRC Peakhurst Wellbeing Team

GRC Peakhurst Campus is committed to the wellbeing of all students in the school by providing a positive and nurturing learning environment where all students are valued. Student wellbeing underpins all teaching and learning programs in an atmosphere of care and concern. GRC Peakhurst Campus not only caters for the academic needs of the child but ensures that its students are given a diverse curriculum and broad range of extra-curricular opportunities to meet the social and emotional needs of young people. It is our focus to equip students with the important life skills they need to be leaders and responsible participants in a rapidly changing world.

The Wellbeing Team consists of the Principal, Deputy Principals, 4 Year Advisors, School Counsellors, Student Wellbeing Committee Co–ordinator, SRC Co–coordinator, Girls Supervisor and Careers Teacher.

As a group, the Wellbeing Team meet regularly to discuss students, review attendance and proactively plan strategies and programs in which to better support student wellbeing in all areas. The Student Wellbeing Team is responsible, along with all members of staff, to ensure that student wellbeing is a high priority within GRC Peakhurst Campus. The Student Wellbeing Team proactively engages with all students individually, in small groups or in year groups to actively promote cognitive, emotional, social, physical and spiritual wellbeing. Students may work with the Year Advisor, Classroom Teachers, Head Teachers the Deputy Principal, the school counsellor or other agencies where appropriate.

The GRC Peakhurst Wellbeing Team creates and delivers exciting programs and initiatives that provide students with opportunities in leadership, mentoring, public speaking, increasing their self-esteem and many other self-awareness activities.

These include programs such as: • The Strength Program • The Shine Program • The Switch Program • Own It Program• Love Bites Program• The Menai Youth Project Program • The Pathfinders Program (Year 6 Transition) • Peer Support • Peer Tutoring • Suicide Awareness Program • Domestic Violence Prevention and Awareness Program • Talk about it Program • Headspace Program • Fundraising for Stewart House • Year 10 Orientation Program • White Ribbon Day • Harmony Day • PBL (Positive Behaviour for Learning) Student Forum • Student Wellbeing Committee • YAP Days (Year Advisor Program Days) • Year Assemblies • Rewards Morning Teas • Rewards excursions

Student Wellbeing Committee – This student committee is actively involved in the promotion of Social Justice Initiatives. A volunteer group of students regularly speak at our formal assemblies and write articles that are published in our schools newsletters. This group is also responsible for activities to promote anti violence against women for White Ribbon day. These students make posters, sell ribbons, produce videos and run whole school assemblies to support this cause.

School Chaplain - In 2018, GRC Peakhurst Campus will maintain Tom Ayres as our school chaplain. Tom works at

GRC Peakhurst each Tuesday providing pastoral care, case management and support to a range of students.

School Partnerships - In 2018, GRC Peakhurst Campus will continue to enhance a range of community partnerships to provide students with a variety of positive and engaging programs to promote wellbeing. Partnerships with Georges River Life Care, 3 Bridges Community, Riverwood Community Centre and the Menai Youth Project form a foundation for a variety of extra curricula programs.

In 2018, Georges River Life Care is running many student-centred programs including the Shine Program and Strength Program across Years 7–9. The Shine Program is an 8 week program for selected female students in Years 7 and 8 held at the school each Thursday afternoon. The program builds on student strengths, looks at self-respect, personal appearance, health, resilience, managing emotions and making students aware of cyber bullying.

The Strength Program – Is a 7 week program for male students in Year 9, facilitated by Tom Ayres (our school chaplain) and two other Youth Workers from Georges River Life Care. Students benefit from the program in the following ways: building on student strengths and respect for self and others, resilience, partying safe, valuing and respecting women and planning for school studies. These activities help empower students with the positive tools for success in the future.

GRC Peakhurst Campus has also continued its successful partnership with 3 Bridges Community Hurstville through running the Own It Program for Boys and girls in Years 8 & 9. This program allows participants to explore and challenge themselves to be leaders. The program empowers students to take responsibility for their behaviours, life choices, life circumstances and provides opportunities for them to further develop leadership skills. This year, 3 Bridges will also continue the Drumbeat program for selected Year 7 students.

Riverwood Community Centre will continue to work with selected Year 7 students through their Skills for Life Program and Year 10 students through their 'Love Bites' program. We are also in the process of developing a number of other initiatives through the Riverwood Community Centre that will hopefully be available for students to access later in the year.

PBL - As part of the PBL (Positive Behaviour for Learning) initiative, all students are invited to place merit cards that they have received for being respectful, responsible and aiming for excellence in a twice a term rewards draw for a gift voucher of their choice to the value of \$20. The first draw of the year will take place during Week 6. Two students from each year group who have submitted their merit certificates into the draw will have the opportunity to win a gift card. All students are encouraged to submit their merit certificates for an opportunity to win a gift card.

AIME will continue to provide a strong foundation for our students offering support every Monday afternoon with homework and assessments. Students will also attend AIME mentoring workshops throughout the year at Sydney University.

GRC Sister School – City meets country

'From little things big things grow', and from a small seed planted many years ago GRC Peakhurst has developed a partnership with Coolah Central School, a small school of 245 students from Kindergarten to Year 12. The school is located 1.5 hours west of Dubbo. The context behind the partnership is to enable the students to share stories, share cultural experiences, engage in developing life long friendships and re connecting with culture and family. The opportunites are endless and offers both schools a chance to explore, experience and connect beyond what they had imagined for themselves.

Coolah Central School's first visit to the big city took place on 22nd February 2018. A bus full of 13 excited students and 4 staff made the adventurous trip to meet our Aborigianl students. On their arrival they were welcomed and introduced to GRC Peakhurst students over pizza and a game of basketball. GRC Peakhurst was presented with a wonderful framed school jersey where the artwork on the jersey was designed by a student at Coolah Central School.

Thursday we meet at Circular Quay for a cultural cruise on the Harbour aboard the Mari Nawi (Tribal Warrior, Bangabaoui education cruise) meaning large boat in Darawahl language. We were given a tour of Clarke Island, a small island on the harbour which is looked after by volunteers as the island was never claimed by either the government of the Darawhal people. An awesome place where we were invited to share stories and songs, and engaged in learning some language.



Learning Circle

Our learning cirlce is well under way and it is expected that planting will begin in Week 6 with all our Koori students being invovled in the project. It is hoped the learning circle will encourage native animals and be a quiet respectful place where students can learn and reflect.
