### **Deputies' Report**

Welcome to Term 4! As we head in to the final term of learning for 2021, and return from four months of Learning From Home, it's a good opportunity to review our core school values as these remain a priority for each and every day. Positive Behaviour for Learning, known as PBL, is an integral part of Georges River College Peakhurst Campus where we value, **Respect, Responsibility and Excellence.** When all expectations related to these values are met, students can feel safe at school, supported at school, and place their energy on learning. There are a few key behaviours that demonstrate these values that we would like to be a focus for Term 4.

- To demonstrate the value of **Responsibility**, it is the student's responsibility to wear their full uniform to school each day. We encourage parents to ensure their child / children comply with our uniform policy. Students who take pride in their uniform also show Respect and pride in their school.
- To ensure students focus on their learning to Aim for Excellence, all students must comply with the phone

policy. Mobile phones and other devices are to be turned off and away, all day. We encourage parents to support this expectation by refraining from making contact via text, messenger, social media applications or by phoning their child's mobile during the school day. Where there is a need for communication between child and parent, students and parents are reminded to do this via our school office. Speakers are not permitted at school.

All of our school values are expectations not only for lessons but also during breaks. To demonstrate Responsibility in the playground, students must act safely by following all school rules and staff directions. We encourage parents to discuss how their child spends recess and lunch, while reinforcing our 'Hands-Off' rule. As a reminder to our school community, this rule is purely about maintaining safety; as such, chasing games, tackle or wrestling games, and 'play' fighting will not be tolerated, as these kind of games may accidently cause injury to another, or cause an escalation of emotions and aggressive behaviour. As we head into the summer months and hot school days, students are reminded that any water games are also not allowed from the perspective of safety for all.

Did you know: Almost 1 in 3 teens are accessing the internet between 10pm and midnight?

We have many conversations with parents and students regarding expectations around social media and gaming. Utilising our core values of **Respect, Responsibility and Excellence** in discussions for non-school topics may also be of assistance in the home. Parents are encouraged to visit the Office of the eSafety Commissioner website to find excellent references and resources regarding these common topics. As students are preparing for end of year exams and assessment tasks, a particular study routine should be developed. Parents and students are encouraged to read the **Study Skills Tip** for November below.

#### STUDY SKILLS TIP FOR NOVEMBER

For many students, a block of examinations and assessments can be daunting. Some students have no idea where to start and what they should work on. The first thing to do if you have examinations approaching in the next few months is to find out what topics will be tested. Even a simple question to teachers can get you started such as 'are we being tested on the whole year's work or just this semester?' Once you know what topics will be covered, organize all of your learning materials and make sure nothing is missing and you have everything you need to review those topics. The next step is to make study notes on these topics if you haven't been doing this throughout the year (hopefully you have!). Next it is time to start learning the notes (testing yourself on them over and over) and doing practice questions to make sure you can apply your knowledge to different types of questions.

If you have a number of weeks prior to the examinations, it is a good idea to make a plan in your diary or phone or on a whiteboard of what subjects you will study when. Try and allocate each subject once or twice each week, depending on the number of examinations you have. As always, all assessment notifications can be viewed on our school website under the Assessment Tasks tab.

### **PDHPE**

The PDHPE faculty is thrilled to have our students back in class and sincerely thank both parents and students for your continued efforts during the learning from home period. Our students have embraced a return to full time face-to-face learning with modified sport and physical activity programs.

Within the Wednesday Sport program, each student will participate in a variety of modified non-contact sports like Cricket, Volleyball, Swedish Longball, Table Tennis and Mini Tennis. Students will also be afforded the opportunity to participate in a range of wellbeing related initiatives during the second hour of the sport program as a way of enhancing not only their physical and social health, but their mental health too. This modified program will continue until further notice. Students and parents will receive further information about the resumption of normal school sport and physical activity within PDHPE/PASS lessons as it is made available by the government.

In an effort to restrict large gatherings within the change rooms, students should come to school wearing their sport uniform and appropriate footwear on allocated days they have a practical PDHPE/PASS lesson for the immediate future. Students will be notified when change rooms will become operational again.

Students are not required to wear their sports uniform on days that they have a theory PDHPE or PASS lesson. Students will be marked as out of uniform if they wear their sports uniform on days in which they do not have a practical lesson. If students are unsure of their allocated practical lessons, they are required to speak to their PDHPE teacher to clarify this.

During practical PDHPE/PASS lessons and School Sport, students should still:

- Practise good hygiene –Students are required to wash their hands prior to and at the conclusion of sport and physical activities.
- Not share items such as drink bottles Students should provide their own personal items such as water bottles and towels.
- Maintain respiratory hygiene whilst participating in sport and physical activity – Encouraging coughs or sneezes to be covered and tissues to be disposed of immediately. Always wash your hands after having coughed, sneezed or blown your nose.

We look forward to the remainder of the Term 4 learning with a range of exciting plans in place.

Subject Selection for Year 10 students was affected by Covid-19 pandemic lockdown as all Subject Selection interviews took place via zoom meetings, last term, during lockdown.

There have been endless messages, many Zoom calls, sent parcels backwards and forwards and we have shared numerous files and feedback, with a number of actively engaged students regarding subject selection, EVET and careers lessons particularly focused on transition planning and resume creation. Some students diligently returned all required paperwork but there are some students whose paperwork is still outstanding. Year 10 students need to check their school email titled "Year 10 Subject Selection Form Collection 2021", received from Ms Antonella Arfanis, to check if all enrolment forms have been submitted.

Students are now required to return all the Enrolment Forms, Choice Submission Forms, EVET Expression of Interest Form, Transition Plan and other subject selection related paperwork provided to you, to Ms Arfanis, Careers Advisor. The Careers Adviser, Ms Arfanis is located in careers Room, D0.14. #### White Card Training is on hold

A white card (or general construction induction card) is a mandatory requirement for workers who want to carry out construction work.

The white card provides people entering the construction industry with a basic knowledge of requirements under

Workplace Health Safety laws, the common hazards and risks likely to be encountered on construction sites and how these risks should be controlled.

The white card becomes void if you haven't attended a construction site for five consecutive years or more.

As lockdown restrictions are slowly lifting, we are entering a time of transition and adjustment. The circumstances of this situation have significantly impacted us all. The scheduled White Card Training is on hold due to Covid-19. GRC is awaiting government to allow visitors to the school to deliver courses. In the event that this does not occur all students who have paid the cost of \$100 will be fully refunded. However, if it does go ahead, the student will be advised of the rescheduled time, when foreseeable.

If students aged 14yo + are interested in undertaking this course, they need to inform Ms Arfanis. Each student interested in undertaking their White Card Training will need to create a Unique Student Identifier number known as a USI before commencement. See Ms Arfanis for a permission note.

#### Work Experience program

While the Year 10 cohort of students are encouraged to attend work experience throughout the year, if they wanted to, they should be aware they are usually expected to attend a mandatory week of work experience in Term 4, however due to the Covid-19 situation, in Sydney, work experience has been cancelled for Terms 3 and 4.

For students in Year 9, **Taronga Western Plains Zoo offers 2022 school work experience.** Applications close 28 February 2022, unless program reaches capacity earlier

#### ACKNOWLEDGEMENT, TALKING AND IDEAS

#### Acknowledge

Acknowledge your child's worries and concerns; make your child feel heard and understood. Instead of saying: - Do not worry about it - You do not need to stress about it. You could try: - I can see that you are feeling worried about going back to school.

#### Talk

Have a conversation about your child's worries; talk through what they are thinking. Instead of saying: - Everything will be ok - That would never happen You could try: - Help me understand what you are worried about - Do you think anyone else feels that way too?

#### Ideas

Brainstorm supportive and helpful ideas together.

The student wellbeing team are ready to help ease your child back into the everyday routine of school life. Every student received a **Returning to School - Wellbeing Guide** during Week 4 and this document was also emailed home to each family. 
### Peer Support

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### School Travel for 2022

#### School Travel for 2022



#### 2022 school travel applications are now open

Students who need a School Opal card or travel pass for 2022 can <u>apply</u> now. A new application will need to be submitted if they are applying for a school travel pass for the first time, or if they are requesting an additional travel entitlement as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).

Students who change address, school, campus location, or who have repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should renew or update their details before the end of term 4. This will ensure that schools can endorse applications and current entitlements are updated and remain valid. School Opal card holders will have the changes applied to their existing card.

If a student's distance eligibility has changed based on their grade the system will automatically update their entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new <u>eligibility criteria</u>, they will receive an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition that is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply

Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their Student Opal card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2022.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the start of the new school year from their nominated transport operator. It may come via the school or be sent directly to them at home. Note: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

#### School Student Transport Scheme site change

On 1 October 2021 the School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) information and application portal was moved to **transportnsw.info**. This will assist families to find all their travel information in the one place.

#### Travel from Term 1 2022

We ask that parents plan ahead and make sure their child knows which service/s to use and has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year.

Applications for the School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) open at the start of Term 4 2021 for travel in 2022, so parents/students can <u>apply</u> or <u>update</u> details early and be ready for the start of the new school year.

Most students using the Opal network will not need a new Opal card and can continue travelling on their existing card each year.

The start of the year is a difficult period for local bus operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket make service planning and operations increasingly difficult.

We recognise that for some families last minute changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. In the Opal network, we strongly encourage these families to have their children travel on a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local bus operator</u> to discuss their travel needs.

Bus operators are flexible and understanding, particularly at the start of the school year, and will ensure students can travel safely to and from school. But to best support our operators we encourage all students to have a valid ticket, as early as possible, from the start of the school year.

Please also remember that students using Opal cards must tap on and tap off in line with the <u>Student code of conduct</u> and <u>Opal terms of use</u>.
