Breaking news in the world of education!

NSW schools are set for their biggest shake-up in 30 years following the release of the interim curriculum review by the NSW government. The review, launched in May 2018, was conducted by Professor Geoff Masters, CEO of the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) and in response to concerns that the NSW curriculum was not preparing students for the 21st century workforce and economy. The NSW Government commissioned Professor Geoff Masters to review the entire school curriculum from Kindergarten to Year 12. The new changes proposed by the review include a de-cluttering of the NSW curriculum and a renewed focus on maths English and science.

'A back to basics approach'

The NSW Premier said the Government "strongly supports a back to basics approach" to the curriculum. "Students need to have strong foundations in maths, English and science to be prepared for the jobs of the future and for attaining lifelong skills", said the NSW Premier.

The NSW Education Minister, believes the draft curriculum review has indicated "significant change" is required to the NSW curriculum. "This is the first review of the curriculum to be done in 30 years. It's a great opportunity for us to reflect on the future of education in NSW and make changes to meet the needs of today's society," said the NSW Education Minister.

"Students need to be equipped with strong literacy and numeracy foundations to succeed in the 21st Century. We want a curriculum that leaves no student behind while stimulating students who are advancing faster than others."

The report said teaching and learning in the senior secondary school are perceived to be "overly focused on examination preparation, maximising the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR), and university entrance."

"The NSW curriculum is insufficiently focused on equipping every student with the knowledge, skills and attributes they will require for further learning, life and work," the report's authors said.

Parents, teachers, students and the public can have a say on the Interim Curriculum Review via the NSW Curriculum Review website.

Consultation closes on 13 December 2019.

The interim report's key recommendations are:

- A stronger emphasis on STEM subjects (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics);
- Reducing the amount of content in the curriculum so students have time to build in depth subject knowledge and develop the skills needed to apply knowledge in the real world;
- Flexible progression that uses levels of attainment to organise syllabuses so students are recognised and challenged according to where they are on the continuum of learning.

Independent Review Lead, Professor Geoff Masters, has developed the Interim Report as a basis for further public consultation. The Interim Report includes 15 reform directions.

In developing the Interim Report, Professor Masters has drawn on feedback from the 2018 consultation, which included 14 public meetings, over 50 stakeholder engagements and 2,100 written submissions. The Interim Report is also informed by guidance from learning research commissioned by the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA), as well as reform initiatives from Australian and international jurisdictions.

Public consultation on the Interim Report will help inform a final report, to be delivered to the Minister for Education and Early Childhood in early 2020.

Deputies' Report

Welcome to Term 4! As we head in to the final term of learning for 2019, it's a good opportunity to review our core school values as these remain a priority for each and every day. Positive Behaviour for Learning, known as PBL, is an integral part of Georges River College Peakhurst Campus where we value, **Respect, Responsibility and Excellence**. When all expectations related to these values are met, students can feel safe at school, supported at school, and place their energy on learning. There are a few key behaviours that demonstrate these values that we would like to be a focus for Term 4.

- To demonstrate the value of **Responsibility**, it is the student's responsibility to wear their full uniform to school each day. We encourage parents to ensure their child / children comply with our uniform policy. Students who take pride in their uniform also show **Respect** and pride in their school.
- To ensure students focus on their learning to Aim for Excellence, all students must comply with the phone policy. Mobile phones and other devices are to be turned off and away, all day. We encourage parents to support this expectation by refraining from making contact via text, messenger, and social media applications or by phoning their child's mobile during the school day. Where there is a need for communication between child and parent, students and parents are reminded to do this via our school office. Speakers are not permitted at school.
- All of our school values are expectations not only for lessons but also during breaks. To demonstrate **Responsibility** in the playground, students must act safely by following all school rules and staff directions. We encourage parents to discuss how their child spends recess and lunch, while reinforcing our 'Hands-Off' rule. As a reminder to our school community, this rule is purely about maintaining safety; as such, chasing games, tackle or wrestling games, and 'play' fighting will not be tolerated, as these kind of games may accidently cause injury to another, or cause an escalation of emotions and aggressive behaviour. As we head into the summer months and hot school days, students are reminded that any water games are also not allowed from the perspective of safety for all.

We have many conversations with parents and students regarding expectations around social media and gaming. Utilising our core values of **Respect, Responsibility and Excellence** in discussions for non-school topics may also be of assistance in the home. Parents are encouraged to visit the Office of the eSafety Commissioner website to find excellent references and resources regarding these common topics. As students are preparing for end of year exams, whether they are during the formal exam schedule or in class assessments, a particular study routine must be developed. Parents and students are encouraged to read the **Study Skills Tip** for October below.

STUDY SKILLS TIP FOR OCTOBER – PREPARING FOR BLOCKS OF EXAMS

For many students, a block of examinations can be daunting. Some students have no idea where to start and what they should work on. The first thing to do if you have examinations approaching in the next few months is to find out what topics will be tested. Even a simple question to teachers can get you started such as 'are we being tested on the whole year's work or just this semester?' Once you know what topics will be covered, organize all of your learning materials and make sure nothing is missing and you have everything you need to review those topics. The next step is to make study notes on these topics if you haven't been doing this throughout the year (hopefully you have!). Next it is time to start learning the notes (testing yourself on them over and over) and doing practise questions to make sure you can apply your knowledge to different types of questions.

If you have a number of weeks prior to the examinations, it is a good idea to make a plan in your diary or phone or on a whiteboard of what subjects you will study when. Try and allocate each subject once or twice each week, depending on the number of examinations you have. PASS CAMP

The purpose of this camp program is to allow students to develop knowledge and understanding about the contribution of physical activity and sport to individual, community and societal wellbeing.

During the three day camp experience the students participated in a selection of the following activities: High Ropes, abseiling, giant swing, rock climbing, leap of faith, mud challenge as well as a team building survivor exercise.

The students who attended are to be commended on their behaviour across the entire 3 days. It was positive to see each student upholding our school values or respectful, responsibility and aiming for excellence.



Road Safety Day - Bstreetsmart

On the 12th September, Year 10 PDHPE students attended a Road Safety incursion at Qudos Bank Arena. The sessions throughout the day were designed to provide students with first-hand experience of road trauma and an understanding of their responsibilities as a driver and as a responsible passenger.

A vast range of information and strategies to avoid serious injuries and death were provided to students by presenters from Bstreetsmart, NRMA and LTrent driving school. We hope that our students now have a greater awareness and understanding of the consequences that can result from distracted driving, speeding, drink/drug driving and driver fatigue. Feedback from the students was very positive and we look forward to participating in similar initiatives next year.



Yr. 9 & 10 PASS Surfing excursion Week 6

As part of the PASS elective, students are completing a unit called Sporting the Risk (Yr9) or Opportunities and Pathways (Yr10) which involves an Aquatics and Surf Lifesaving component. To further complement each unit and enrich their learning, students will be participating in a Safe Surfing Level 1 program with Cronulla Surfing Academy. The session will be conducted by fully qualified, experienced instructors at Wanda Beach, Cronulla during Week 6, Term 4.

A number of steps are involved before an SBAT can take place such as deciding on the trade or vocation, finding an employer, seeking out a registered training organisation (RTO) and signing up to a training plan contract. The sooner the process starts, the higher the success of it coming to fruition. If an SBAT is granted it will usually mean students will only be out of school 1 x day per week during school term to attend paid work, and one day training at an RTO if not VETiS in school course.

For a full time apprenticeship or traineeship, you need to source a host employer and then Ms Arfanis will guide you through the process.

Year 10 students looking for Full Time Course or Full Time Employment

If you are leaving School for a Full Time Course (of 20 hours + a week) or Full Time Employment (of 25 hours + a week), see Ms Arfanis who will guide you through the process.

White Card Training

White Card Training course in NSW is designed to raise awareness of best practices to eliminate risks that cause injuries and fatalities in the work place. In order to work in the Construction Industry, you need to complete a White Card course.

GRC has offered this course to students on four previous occasions and the next course is scheduled for Friday, 22 November, held at GRC Peakhurst. The course requires the ability to demonstrate personal awareness of Work Health & Safety (WHS) legislative requirements, and the basic principles of risk management and prevention of injury and illness in the construction industry.

This White Card course covers the basic WHS knowledge required prior to commencing work tasks within any of the sectors of the construction industry. Students planning to choose VETiS Construction Pathways as a subject in 2020 at the senior college will be required to have done this training.

Resume Building Workshop – scheduled for November 18

As we move toward the summer holiday period, many Year 10 students may be interested in creating a resume if they are hoping to get a part-time or casual job. They will be given this opportunity after attending their work experience placement. If you're a teenager looking for a part-time or casual job, it's probably time to write your first resume. It's helpful to speak to Ms.Arfanis about how to develop a resume for those students looking for a part-time or casual job in the holidays or after school. Interested students should register their intention to attend the **Resume Building Workshop** with Ms.Arfanis ASAP so that you don't miss out. Georges River College Peakhurst Campus is committed to and passionate about Aboriginal Education and provides a culturally inclusive learning environment, not only catering to their educational engagement but ensuing that a diverse curriculum and breathe of extra-curricular opportunities are availed to meet the cultural needs of our Aboriginal students.

During term 3 the students have been involved in gathering information for their Leadership by the River project which is to review and update the current Acknowledgment to Country. The updated content will be in partnerships with other GRC campuses with the final result being displayed across different locations within the school grounds.

Identity is important to us all, without our identity we are lost, our wellbeing suffers and we struggle to belong as we yearn for the missing pieces of our lives.

On Thursday 29 August 2019 we departed for our once in lifetime trip to the Northern Territory where we were excited to connect with culture, connect with our identity and learn traditional ways and it did not disappoint. We travelled over 3152 km to Darwin by air and then another 220 km to our first destination Kakadu National Park Murdudjul Homeland.

After 4 days of immersing in culture at Murdujurl travelling the yellow waters of Kakdau on a river cruise we moved on to Arnhem Land Mikin Valley, visiting sacred sites, museums and sacred rock art. The trip was eventful as we crossed Australia's most dangerous crock infested river into Arnhem land swam in the East Alligator River, crocodiles on the wild croc tour, went fishing for Barramundi in secret water holes, made digeridoos, clap sticks, painted and learnt the ancient art of weaving.

The trip into our mother country and the experience was amazing as we camped underneath more stars then I have ever seen lighting up the sky of a night we didn't need electricity, we enjoyed activities under the bluest sky mother nature could offer and listened to the magical howls of the dingoes of a night.

The last few days we headed to Gunbulunya to visit the infamous Injalak Art centre where traditional artworks are sold nationally and internationally. Here our students had a firsthand experience on making traditional artworks where Jermaine had the opportunity to use the screen printing machine to recreate a traditional story. From here we travelled through Jabiru and back to Marrakai re-joining civilisation having a hot shower and chocolate was never so welcomed. The students met every expectation and challenge set with enthusiasm and courage, it was a tough 10 days but we formed friendships that would last a lifetime, regained identity and found our place where we were accepted and felt a sense of belonging.

On Friday 19 October a group of our pacific island students were invited to perform at the Menai Youth Annual meeting. The students proudly represented the school and performed in front of their peers at the venue practicing in their own time and organising their traditional dress for the day. They are to be congratulated on the initiative to continue to inform the community of the diverse traditions and culture of GRC Peakhurst Campus.
