Task Information:

In this assessment task, you are expected to write a feature article for a magazine aimed to young adults with limited understanding of the topic.

You should focus your article on answering the following question:

How did Henry's responsibility to continue his dynasty impact his marriages and what happened to his wives?

You will be marked on your ability to *inform* and *persuade* your audience about the reasons why Henry needed a wife and how and why his wives died.

- In addition to work we complete in class, research information on the live and death of his six wives. Make sure you note evidence that *supports* your argument.
- Use the information you have collected and the 'Feature Article Information' to write your article.article.
- Page limit: 2-3 typed pages maximum.
- Your feature article must be handed in electronically via Google Classroom.
- Refer to the marking criteria to ensure you meet the requirements of the task. You have 3 different grade options.

- 1. Catherine of Aragon (Divorced)
- 2. Anne Bolyn (Beheaded)
- 3. Jane Seymour (Died)

- 4. Anne of Cleeves (Divorced)
- 5. Catherine Howard (Beheaded)
- 6. Catherine Parr (Survived)

Note: This task is part of your formal assessment in this subject. Tasks not submitted on the scheduled date will receive zero. Failure to attempt this task may affect your Record of School Achievement (ROSA). If you are sick on the scheduled date, you will have to provide appropriate documentation, such as a medical certificate, to support your appeal.

Option 1: A-E gradeResponse includes

- Expertly and effectively use language to inform, entertain and persuade your audience.

Option2: B-E Grade

- Clearly communicate the reasons why Henry VII needed a wife.
- Explain why and how each of his wives died.
- Support ideas with relevant historical evidence (primary and secondary)
- Clearly communicate in written form using appropriate article structure, spelling, punctuation and grammer.
- Appropriately use a range of historical terms
- Effectively use language to inform, entertain and persuade your audience.

Option 3: C-E Grade

- Describe who Henry VIII's wives were and how they died.
- Support ideas with some relevant historical evidence (Primary and/or secondary)
- Communicate in written form using appropriate article structure and mostly correct spelling, punctuation and grammar
- Appropriately use some historical terms
- Attempt to use language to inform, entertain and persuade

Feature article: Scaffold

Use this information to assist you to structure your feature article.

Language

- short paragraphs
- descriptive, colourful but simple language
- rhetorical questions
- present tense
- quotations
- third person mixed with first person comment

Design features

- set out in columns
- use of graphics (photographs, drawings, graphs, cartoons)
- background colour
- use of sub headings and by-lines

Structure

interesting and catchy title to attract readers

Headline Introductory

- anecdote, short narrative to illustrate the issue and introduce the topic
- paragraph/By-line
- the introduction/by-line contains a 'teaser' which supports the headline and aims to draw in the reader

Body

- statement of the issue supported by facts, quotes and personal comment
- anecdotes to illustrate points
- descriptive paragraphs

Conclusion

statement summarising the writer's perspective and attitude
