Task Information:

The assessment will take place under examination conditions and will involve:

ONE STEEL PARAGRAPH where you will compare one scene from Baz Luhrmann's film version of 'Romeo and Juliet' to the original Shakespearean text.

To prepare for this section, you should ensure that you have a thorough understanding of the following key scenes in both texts:

- Act One, Scene One: The opening fight scene
- Act One, Scene Five: The party scene
- Act Two, Scene Two: The balcony scene
- Act Three, Scene One: The main fight scene
- Act Five, Scene Three: The death scene

Important Note:

If you are absent on the day of the task you will need to provide the Head Teacher, Mr Zouroudis, with a medical certificate. It is then your responsibility to organise an alternative date with the teacher / Head Teacher English to complete the assessment. Failure to do so will result in a zero mark being awarded.
